

Names will be randomly selected from the list of households who have attended weekend Masses. Those selected will be contacted by Sunday, February 14.




Masses will be at 10 am, 5:30 pm, and 7:30 pm.

Birthright relies on the dedication, time, and talents of volunteers and the generosity of donations to ensure it can persevere in supporting expecting mothers.

- Vision: To reduce the stigma associated with being a single mother and lower the number of pregnancies terminated due to a lack of resources or support for the mother.

CWL News - MAiD (Medical Assistance in Dying) – Bill C-7

Bill C-7 (an Act amending the Criminal Code in Canada to expand medical assistance in dying) has already passed in the House of Commons and will come up in the Senate when the session begins on February 2, 2021.

The Senate is engaging in a study of Bill C-7 which seeks to expand euthanasia and assisted suicide in Canada. It is important for the Senate to know about the concerns of Canadian Citizens and Catholics who believe in respect for life from conception to natural death.

Archbishop Richard Gagnon (Winnipeg), on behalf of all Catholic bishops in Canada “calls on Catholics and all people of good will to make their voices heard in opposition of the Bill. As Canadians, we can and must do better.”

This information is time sensitive; we request your assistance now.

We urge you to write to your Senators and request they stand up to the courts and re-establish Parliament as the voice of the people of Canada. Sample letters are included with this bulletin.

We want our country to be one which supports the vulnerable. Proposed changes add to societal stereotypes that a life with a disability is a life not worth living. By supporting this bill, the government of Canada is supporting these stereotypes. We Do NOT want to extend the criteria for MAiD. More information is on the Saskatchewan CWL website www.cwlsk.ca



Who - Led by Archdeacon Cheryl Toth (Stewardship Officer with the Anglican Diocese of Qu'Appelle) and up to 12 participants.



The federal legislation on euthanasia has positioned itself as a healthcare "right" under the *Canada Health Act* so it is publicly funded and accessible to all. Palliative care, however, is not afforded the same status. Dying patients should have access to palliative care as a right.

Will your government undertake a five-year review of the system of euthanasia in Canada as was promised when assisted dying was legalized in 2016 in response to a Supreme Court ruling?

As a Senator, will you support correcting the major flaws in the legislation, Bill C-7, to protect vulnerable Canadians?
