

A Cemetery Within Our Parish

Many of you may not be aware that we have a cemetery within the boundaries of St. Cecilia Parish. It is located on Pinkie Road just west of the Paul Dojack Centre and was part of the site of the Regina Indian Industrial School (RIIS) which was in existence between 1891 and 1910.



The RIIS was a program set up by the federal government of the time for the purpose of 'Christianizing' indigenous children and providing them with a basic education and trade skills to integrate them into white society. These industrial schools were operated and staffed by various Christian churches as were many other residential schools at the time.

During its time of operation, the RIIS was beset with financial underfunding and health issues of its indigenous residents. Polluted drinking water, poor ventilation in the building, and a lack of proper physical health exercises and activities led to serious respiratory illnesses including tuberculosis. As many as 35 students died during their stay there and never returned home, while many others who did return suffered chronic illness and died prematurely. Those who were buried on the grounds of the RIIS also included several of the young children of the school principal, Mr. McLeod.

The site of the cemetery was almost forgotten after the school went out of service and was later destroyed by fire in the early 1940's. The early grave markers, except for one small gravestone, had long disappeared.

In the last several years a Commemorative Association has taken on the task of restoring the cemetery with a new fence, a proposed commemorative cairn and a small parking area to accommodate ceremonies. For more information, Google Regina Indian Industrial School.

As the closest church to the cemetery, we have been approached by the Commemorative Association to help in the restorative maintenance of the cemetery, by volunteering to mow the grass within the confines of the fenced area during the Spring and Summer months. It is not a large area and would only require a group of 4 - 5 people, equipped with a couple of lawn mowers and a 'weed wacker'. 

Archdiocese of Regina Celebrates Reverence for Life Month

Message from Archbishop Don.

Warm Greetings in the Risen Lord!

Sisters and Brothers, as you know, we have moved the Reverence for Life month to May. It is appropriate that we celebrate life in a special way in this month where life is bursting forth from the earth. We see it in the crops planted and sprouting, the leaves burgeoning forth on the trees, the spring flowers budding and opening in their simple splendour. It is also the month of Mary, Patroness of our Archdiocese and of our Cathedral, Holy Rosary.

When God in Christ embarked on the extraordinary journey of becoming human, he began, like each one of us, as a child in the womb of his mother. As I tell kids at confirmation, God has authored each one of us, personally, with the help of our parents; has moulded and fashioned us, breathed life into us. To be human is to be touched by God, created for life with God. All of that is deepened in an unfathomable wonderful way when God takes on human life. What it is to be human, bones, breath, growth, wonder, thinking, feeling, touching, loving, this is made holy in an altogether new way by God's becoming who and what we are. Jesus's Incarnation sanctified not only Mary's womb, but the wombs of all mothers. In becoming one with us, the Lord made all human life holy and taught us again and again to recognize our dignity and our identity as beloved children of God.


It is this identity that he shows to us when we are tempted to believe we are not worthy of love. And it is this identity that he asks us to recognize in every human person, at any stage or condition of life, whose life and dignity is threatened. Life is the first gift. It is precious and holy. This is why it is essential for us, as followers of Jesus, to work to defend the right to life of all our brothers and sisters with courage and determination. A just society can only be built on the recognition of the dignity and right to life of every human person.

Today it can be easy to be discouraged on this front. But, as disciples of Jesus and as the Church, we also know that we are in this for the long haul. Be encouraged, then, brothers and sisters, because the Lord of life, who came into the world as a little child 2000 years ago, is with us still today and because no darkness can ultimately prevail over the light and truth of Jesus Christ.

Many of you will be familiar with Indigenous Christian Fellowship’s annual community “Walk of Faith, Hope and Love”, a walk through North Central Regina to fund raise for the ministry. In past years participants have enlisted donors to “sponsor” their walk and we have then walked together on Pentecost Sunday, gathering at ICF, 3131 Dewdney Avenue.

Born and raised in Edmonton, the Rev. Canon Dr. Scott Sharman is the Animator for the Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations for the Anglican Church of Canada. His primary work and ministry today is coordinating the Anglican Church of Canada's ecumenical partnerships with various churches at the national level, including bilateral dialogues and commissions with the Evangelical Lutheran, Mennonite, United and Roman Catholic traditions, as well as working closely with the twenty-six Christian denominations which are members of the multilateral coalition known as the Canadian Council of Churches. He also represents the Anglican Church of Canada in a number of capacities in the interfaith context, working especially in the areas of Christian-Muslim and Christian-Jewish relations.

For the protection and health of all in our St. Cecilia community, each person wanting to come to the church must take this self-assessment.

1.	Do you have any of the following symptoms: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Feeling unwell including fever, cough, sore throat.• Nausea, Vomiting, Diarrhea.• Unexplained loss of appetite.• Loss of sense of taste or smell.
2.	Have you travelled outside of Canada in the last 14 days?
3.	Have you had close contact without a mask or other appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) with someone who has travelled outside of Canada in the last 14 days?
4.	Have you had close contact without a mask or other appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) in the last 14 days with someone who is ill with Covid-19 symptoms?
5.	Have you or anyone in your household had close contact without a mask or other appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) in the last 14 days with someone who is being investigated or confirmed to be a case of Covid-19?

If you answered "Yes" to any of the above questions, you are encouraged to stay home and DO NOT come to the Church at this time.

If you answered "No" to all the above questions, you may come to the Church.
